# A Year of Stories

One of the new developments at CDU is an outreach to our graduates. In a recent survey of graduates of our MA (Theology) program, we learned that over 90% of our graduates are serving the Church in some capacity as a volunteer, a professional working for the Church, or in a professional career that highlights or enhances the work of the Church.

As the Board of Trustees prepares to begin a multi-year comprehensive development campaign that includes a significant fundraising goal of at least three million dollars, we want to engage the entire CDU community. We are beginning with a deeper engagement with our graduates and students who experience firsthand the value of our mission.

One project I have begun is a Year of Stories. I am reaching out to graduates to listen to their stories of how they found CDU, why they chose an online program, why they decided to study theology at CDU, and how their program has changed them.

Our students who earn online degrees in Theology are pioneers. Most tell us that without an online program their degree in Theology would have been impossible to attain. Our graduates are not traditional students who sit in classrooms on campuses. Many tell me they are not sure why they are completing an MA (Theology) online, but they sensed a call from God and are sure they will have an answer.


In the Year of Stories, I am also asking our graduates to try to quantify a CDU education through their own networks of influence including family, neighbors, parish, work, diocese, volunteer work, or professional work for the Church.

Admiral William McRaven's commencement address at the


University of Texas in 2014 began with a challenge to graduates: if each graduate changed the lives of just ten people, and each one of those ten folks changed the lives of another ten people—then in five generations (125 years)—the graduates will have changed the lives of 800 million people.

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He used the example of soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan who daily made a decision to go

The answer to that question inspires us to share a Year of Stories about our graduates and the power of online education to form leaders for the new evangelization. You may envision a new wing on a Greek revival style building when you hear of a "library expansion," or worn carpeting being the result of increasing traffic. CDU's campus library is vastly different. It is state of the art, always open, continuously growing, offers fingertip accessibility, and the book you need is never missing, or damaged. CDU's library is digital just like our courses. Easy, instant access to religious e-books and Catholic resources from anywhere in the world is a digital reality on CDU's campus. The CDU library is booming in utility and traffic, rivaling many bricks and mortar university libraries. Student Lee Anna De la Cruz agrees, "I figure this comes from ours

being an online university, but it seems like we have much more online library options here than did my last university."

The CDU Library serves 476 students and faculty members that visit thousands of times each year for free resource links, Cat encyclopedias, and EBSCO e-books. The number of visits in the last 12 months has tripled over the previous year. Over the same period, EBSCO database usage doubled and Catholic Encyclopedia usage grew 674%. CDU's Librarian, Sister Rebecca Abel, O.S a resource in herself. Both students and alumni count on Sister's passion and expertise to direct them to new discoveries. Sister Rebecca claims "a new introduction on to how to use the library for research, accessible personal support, more awareness and partnerships to enhance ebook resources have made a big difference." She continues, "Digital resource opportunities are explodiand CDU is in a unique position to build a digital library that can fulfill our mission to "teach all nations."

## Your Religious Journey Can Include a Trip to Italy

While Christianity was born in the middle East, it was Italy that became, within a few decades after Christ's resurrection, the Crossroads of the Christian world. For two thousand vears Christians from East and West, North and South, have come to Italy to serve Christ and His Church. In this course (*Theo 599*), Dr. Marcellino D'Ambrosio, (CDU professor and New York Times best-selling author) will examine the lives and work of many great Christians who spent part of their lives in central Italy. The apostles Peter and Paul, the native Italians Sts. Benedict, Clare, and Francis, the Spaniard St. Ignatius of Lovola, the Greek missionaries Sts. Cyril and Methodius, the great artists Michelangelo and Raphael, all these and more will be the subject of our study. Our learning will primarily take place on site for ten days in Rome, Assisi, Florence, and Orvieto. Prior to the trip, there will be some fascinating reading and online discussion which will be the basis for a term paper to be submitted after the

The goal of this interdisciplinary course will be to give the student an appreciation of the depth and breadth of the Catholic culture represented by the abundant monuments to faith found in central Italy. For graduate students, the course can count toward a concentration in Scripture, Theology/Philosophy, Ecclesial Service or Catholic Culture or toward the certificate program in Scripture or Church History, provided one completes a research assignment appropriate to one's area of study. #### New Certification Course in Catholic Healthcare Ethics

Is it ever appropriate to cease life support? What should a Catholic consider when writing a living will? What is the Catholic position on new reproductive technologies, genetics, and stem cell procedures? Stephen Bozza, author and instructor of CDU's new Catholic Healthcare Ethics course will answer these questions and more.

Learn how to practice, counsel and live in a way that is more respectful of the life, dignity and nature of the human person. Participants will be equipped with the knowledge to help families and individuals make serious healthcare decisions that are consistent with Catholic moral teaching. This 16-hour, four-week, fully-online, certification course is offered with a focus on diaconal formation and continuing medical education for physicians. Steven Bozza, MA, PhD cand. (STD) is the Director of the Office of Life and Family for the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, an Adjunct Professor of Biomedical Ethics and Moral Theology, and the media contact for the United States Catholic Conference of Bishops Department of Pro Life Activities for issues related to Artificial Reproductive Technologies. "This course is one of the few authentic, values based, online continuing education seminars offered on faithful healthcare ethics," says Bozza. Each week there are readings, videos, questions for discussion and written assignments that apply lessons to real life situations. Instruction includes the language to articulate the Church's moral teaching as expressed in the Ethical and Religious Directives.

"Understanding and advancing the culture of life in accordance with The Faith is especially important in a time of social misinformation," says Bozza. By the end of the course, participants will be equipped to provide ethical information to those in need of expertise and guidance.
